WELCOME ABOARD ADMIRAL!
In ceremonies on board USS TRI-

In ceremonies on board USS TRI-TON (SSN 586), 19 November 1966, Vice Admiral Arnold F. SCHADE U.S. Navy relieved Vice Admiral Vernon L. LOWRANCE, U.S. Navy as Commander Submarine Forces, U.S. Atlantic Fleet. Admiral LOW-RANCE has commanded the Atlantic Fleet Submarine Force since September 1964. He is in receipt of orders to duty in Washington, D.C., where he will serve as Deputy Director of the Defense Intelligence Agency.

During the past two years the Atlantic Fleet Submarine Force has enjoyed tremendous successes under Admiral LOWRANCE's outstanding leadership---we will surely miss him.

In Vice Admiral SCHADE we are fortunate in getting another of the type leader with which we have been blessed in the past. Admiral SCHADE has been awarded the Navy Cross, Silver Star, Bronze Star with Gold Star and Combat "V" in addition to the Navy Unit Commendation and the Legion of Merit. His Navy Cross citation reads as follows:

"By rendering skillful and able assistance to his Commanding Officer during months of maneuvering through an area continuously menaced by enemy air and surface craft, Lieutenant Commander SCHADE contributed in large measure to the success of the GROWLER's patrols. On the early morning of February 7, 1943, after a surface encounter with a Japanese

COMMAND COLUMN

The mission of CANOPUS is to support the submarines of Squadron SIXTEEN, to send them on patrol prepared, insofar as we have the ability for a successful run. The patrols carried out by these SSBN's have an important influence on the foreign policy of the United States.

The presence of the 1200 members of the CANOPUS crew in Spain can also, by itself, affect United States foreign policy. Your actions ashore can lead to improved United States - Spanish relationships or conceivably could cause the Spanish to deny the use of the Rota Naval Base to the United States.

It is unlikely that such lofty ideas have motivated the good conduct ashore of CANOPUS personnel. The reasons probably are your own courtesy and thoughtfulness, and your respect for the rights and the customs of others.

A very small number of the crew have found no reason to behave decently ashore. Most of these have drunk too much and have, as a minimum, made a public spectacle of themselves while intoxicated. In other cases the drinking leads to brawling, to insulting attitudes toward women, to destruction of property, or to automobile accidents.

Such public displays of discourtesy and bad taste will not be tolerated by the Spanish or by me. Each individual will be held responsible for his behavior ashore. In addition. I not only expect but I require that the petty officers of this ship do their utmost to prevent any incidents. This must be done by your example, your counselling, and when necessary, by sending back to the ship men whose judgment is becoming impaired by too much drinking. This is not only a proper exercise of your authority and your leadership but is a favor to a man who might otherwise disgrace himself.

For the good conduct of the vast majority I am proud and grateful. For the few who have not matched their drinking to their capacity for alcohol, I wish to make clear how serious I consider any action which discredits CANOPUS, our Navy, and our country in the eyes of the Spanish. Those who can not confine their drinking to what they can handle should stop drinking. There are inumerable amusements, pastimes, and adventures in Spain and on the Base. The least profitable and productive and the most expensive of these is drinking. If you must drink to excess, do it on the Base. It will get you into far less trouble, and at least vou will not make a spectacle of yourself in front of our hosts.

The pride of workmanship which CANOPUS personnel put into their performance of duty on board has resulted in SSBN's finishing refit in fine material condition, ready for patrols which support our foreign policy. All hands, not just almost everyone, must take similar pride in tow they conduct themselves ashore. We are not fulfilling our mission properly if we do not all support our country and our Navy wholeheartedly both on board and on the beach.



AS - 9 News



We have added a significant item to our CANOPUS (AS-9) memorabilia in the message above which is now framed and hanging in the Captain's Cabin. The inscription thereon reads as follows "Original dispatch as received on board CANOPUS (AS-9) 7 December 1941. Donated by Raymond W. Kirk ATC USN (ret) who received it as Radioman of the Watch and carried with him thereafter through three and a half years in Japanese prisoner of war camps". Our grateful thanks to Mr. Kirk.

The following letter was received from Captain Paul H. VERD USN(ret):

"After reading Admiral SACK-ETT's story of the CANOPUS and its heroic crew, and after hearing the tales of those crew members who fought on Bataan and Corregidor, and then were captured. I doubt if anything I might have to report, specifically as far as the CANOPUS is concerned, would be of much interest. But I shall do the best I can.

Prior to 1941 I was a Naval Reserve Ensign (Naval ROTC - University of Washington, 1931), an electrical engineer, and a specialist and pioneer in the diesel locomotive field. Because of engine problems on the Perch, Pickerel, Permit class of submarines then on Asiatic Station, I was called to active duty in April 1941 and sent out to Manila and to the CANOPUS.

So the CANOPUS became my first ship. And what a good ship she was. Certainly not very beautiful, but a

good ship in all respects from stem to stern and from top to bottom. And this description includes the Captain. officers and crew - their attitude. state of well being and efficiency. It should be noted that a submarine tender may have many things to cause discord, such as division and squadron staffs on board, and the submarine crews alongside who often forget that the tender is in the same war with them. But the CANOPUS was a happy ship for all concerned, and did its level best to cheerfully render all services possible to the submarines. Its reputation with the boats and staffs it handled was tops.

I served as a member of the CANO-PUS crew from 13 May 1941 until 9 October 1941 (Assistant Repair Officer). From then on I served as a submarine staff officer hanging my hat on various tenders or submarines as the occasion arose. Most of the time before I was ordered out of Bataan to Australia repairing a submarine engine en route, the CANOPUS was my home. Therefore, I have very strong attachment for her and for her able crew.

With the exception of the last two months of the war, my time was spent on many tenders and bases, refitting submarine in Java, Australia, Pearl Harbor and the Marshal Islands. But no ship ever left me with such a "belonging" feeling as did the CANO-PUS. And that is why I was so thrilled to be able to attend the launching of the new CANOPUS.

May I thank you for keeping me on the mailing list of your fine magazine, the HELMSMAN, and may my hope and wish for the new CANOPUS materialize that you achieve the kind of reputation for service, efficiency and general well being on station that was earned by your predecessor."

Last Will and Testament

CAMP PENDELTON, CALIF.,....
"If I am killed while carrying out
this mission, I want no one to cry or
mourn for me.....," said Private First
Class Richard E. Marks. "...Since I
have been here I have been scared
many times...I want to say that I am
here as a result of my own desire...I
am here because I have always wanted to be a Marine...I am fighting to
practice and maintain what I believe
in and what to live in, a democratic
society....I don't like being over here
but I am doing a job that must be
done."

The letter containing these sentiments written by Marks appeared recently in a New York Surrogate Court where, as the last Will and Testament of Richard E. Marks, Private First Class, USMC, they were being probated.

Nineteen year old Marks was killed last February in Vietnam. Before he died he wrote 77 such letters tracing his emotions and attitudes toward America, the Marine Corps and combat in Vietnam.

He hoped that if he was killed carrying out his mission no one would cry for him and he wrote that he wanted people to "...hold their heads high and be proud of me for the job I did. We are proud.

If he retired as E-9 he would receive \$112,741.00. You could never afford to make the payments on insurance policy that would start paying you this type of money at the age of 38.

A new EM College Degree plan is now in the pilot stages. If this works out like I think it will then a lot of EM's will get the chance to better their education. Part of the plan is for colleges to give credit toward the associate degree for knowledge and skills leamed in service schools. Under this program a Navy man can not only advance himself in his specialty but he will also be working toward a degree. This program is ONLY being considered for the NAVY, and it look like it is well on it's way to being a great sucess.

It all boils down to just one thing, the NAVY offers you the chance of a life time to better your education, to be a sucess in your chosen field, and to retired with a steady income at an early age. But, all the programs in the world can do no good unless YOU TAKE ADVANTAGE OF THEM.
