For information, the fund for financing tours has already been augmented as a result of a comment from one of the crew. The recreation fund has been set up for just this type of activity and it should benefit all hands in the best way possible. Currently the balance in our recreation fund permits some expansion of the recreation program. Now is a good time to get your ideas in.

In closing I would like to pass along to you the compliments of several flag officers of all services, both U. S. and Allied, as well as the distinguished guests who have been aboard CANOPUS during the past few weeks. Without exception, they have been extremely complimentary to you for your performance, appearance, and conduct. The fine reputation of CANOPUS is being added to, not only in the submarine force but throughout the fleet, as a result of your fine performance. 


Navigational "Pub" corrections are made by QM2 SMITH.

A DIVISIO

Few people aboard CANOPUS realize the importance of the AUX-ILIARIES Division. "A" Division is responsible for the maintenance of all auxiliary equipment outside of the main engineering spaces (i.e. Enginermom-Fireroom). There are very few spaces aboard CANOPUS that do not have equipment in them that "A" Division would be called upon to repair. The Division also supplies services to SSBN's such as air conditioning chilled water, liquid oxygen and nitrogen, high pressure air, and steam.

On board CANOPUS, "A" Division is responsible for the maintenance of all air conditioning and refrigeration, laundry and galley equipment, liquid oxygen and nitrogen (OZN2), high and low pressure air systems, the ships cranes, elevators and conveyors, steering gear, anchor windlasses, warping capstans, ships boats and the emergency diesel generator.

It is a full time job keeping all this machinery in operating condition, but, the men of "A" Division tackle their jobs with enthusiasm and never fail to do their job quickly and efficiently.

Overseas Military **Banking Programs**

Programs offering higher interest rates on servicemen's accounts at overseas military banking facilities were expanded upon in two year-end moves designed to make banking more attractive to military personnel and help reduce gold flow.

The Treasury Department, in cooperation with the Department of Defense, authorized military banking facilities to pay four percent interest on servicemen's individual savings accounts anywhere overseas beginning Feb. 1.

Pentagon officials said AMEXCO. Bank of America, Guarantee Trust, Chase Manhattan and First National City Banks were given this new authority to make interest rates on savings accounts the same in all oversea

In a second action, Treasury made the program for paying interest on checking accounts available to servicemen in Taiwan, effective Jan. 1. The program was previously limited to men serving in Thailand and Vietnam. ANSWERS to Famous Quotations

Officials stressed that the Taiwan program was a test, marking the first time interest on checking accounts had been extended from a war zone to a peaceful area. Thailand and Vietnam checking accounts at five percent are permanent programs and have been in effect since banks opened there.

All overseas banking programs are intended as companion pieces to the Uniformed Services Savings Deposit Program, and are not competitive with it, officials said. They pointed out that the overseas deposits program, paying 10 percent interest, is strictly a savings program and that servicemen cannot withdraw money from accounts until their return from overseas.

The programs for overseas savings and checking accounts are designed to provide servicemen with attractive interest rates in accounts with the same flexibility offered in banks at home.

The responsibility of every American is to be well informed about local, national and international affairs. This responsibility of good citizenship is vital.
