COMMAND COLUMN

Dolphin Scholarship Competition Opens

The Director of the Dolphin Scholarship Foundation, Mrs. A. F. SCHADE, wife of the Atlantic Fleet Submarine Force Commander, this week announced March 15, 1968 as the deadline for application in the 1968 Dolphin Scholarship competition.

Scholarships are awarded to selected students who are sons or daughters (natural, adopted or stepchild) of members or former members (officer and enlisted) of the Submarine Forces and in the U.S. Navy, living or deceased, who have served in the Submarine Forces at least five years after qualification, or served at least six years with the Submarine Forces at various support activities. Look Out for Small Loan Companies

When banks turn down a loan, often a borrower turns to a small loan company as a last resort. Be careful.

The small loan company specializes in short-term loans of no great size. It may charge interest alone or it may pad the interest with a number of service charges, these can include credit checks, insurance, bookkeeping -- even a charge for the application.

If you must deal with a small loan company, be sure that all charges are clearly understood and in writing. Read every word of the contract before signing, not after you've spent the money and gone home.

Most companies charge an interest rate of from one and one half percent to three and one halfpercent a month. This is an effective rate of about 18 to 42 percent per year. And that, in anvone's language is high.

Service people in financial difficulties may seek advice from the legal officer.. If there is an emergency Navy Relief might be able to help. There is always the chance that the money really isn't necessary. And then no one needs a loan.

News Continued from Last Issue

On the 6th of May, 1942, General Wainwright after communication with President Roosevelt decided to surrender the fortress complex at the entrance of Manila Bay. He had some time convincing "Tiger" Yamashita that he could not surrender other USAFFE forces in the archipelago, and the "Tiger" be came recomciled to this matter, the terms of surrender being drawn up at a meeting on Bataan between the two generals. The last message that "Skinny" Wainwright sent the President before communications were eliminated is quoted herewith - I saw it in the rough draft in Molinta tunnel before it was sent. "With broken heart and head bowed in sadness but not in shame I report to Your Excellency that today I must arrange terms for the surrender of the for tified islands of Manila Bay. There is a Limit to human endurance and that limit has long since been past. Without prospect of relief I feel it is my duty to my country and to my gallant troops to end this useless effusion of blood and human sacrifice. If you agree, Mr. President, please say to the Nation that my troops and I have accomplished all that is humanly possible and that

primarily in the construction, repair or overhaul of vessels of the Submarine Forces; schools engaged primarily in the instruction and training of Submarine Forces personnel; Naval laboratories with a primary mission of support of the Submarine Forces; non-qualified personnel on Force, Flotilla, Squadron and Division staffs; and Naval personnel of all special facilities and officers whose primary mission is support of the Submarine Forces in any capacity.

Time required in the Submarine Forces is waived if the member dies while on active duty in the Submarine Forces.

Data photos taken in orbit aboard Biosatellite II appear to demonstrate that plants depend on gravity for orientation.

The photos showed pronounced disorientation of leaves and stems of the four pepper plants photographed during the two-day flight launched Sept. 7.

The experiment was the first time the National Aeronautics and Space Administration had attempted to grow a broad-leaf plant in the absence of gravity.

Photos recovered after the flight showed that five hours of zero gravity apparently caused the leaves of one plant to bend noticeably from their horizontal position. After 12 weightless hours, the leaves were down almost 90 degrees, and after 18 hours they were touching the stem.

we have upheld the best traditions of the United States, its Army and its Navy, May God bless and preserve you and guide you and the Nation in the effort to ultimate victory. With profound regret and with continued pride in my gallant troops I go to meet the Japanese commander. Goodbye, Mr. President." That was all. Nothing more on the air except the coded gibberish of the Japanese military announcing their victory and redeploying their forces for a further push southward towards Down Under.

Most of our personal gear was taken from us by the Japanese, leaving us but with a few articles of clothing. They promptly placed crude numbers on our shirt backs and we were herded under guard down the east slope of Molinta Hill to an area that had once been a seaplane hangar and ramp area, now known as 92nd Garage from the unit designati, n of the Motor Transport outfit that used it. Later we came to call it "El Andersonville." The sepia tint shows 92nd Garage viewed from the slope of Molinta. There were some 13,000 men here jammed into the encompassing linit of a few acres and we dug up old bits of poncho, bamboo strips, old corrugated roofing tin and anything else that came to hadn to erect our hutches and shelters. All we had to eat was what we had brought with us upon surrender and the only source of fresh water was an old stone-lined Spanish well that had been sunk there in the prison compound in the middle 1600's, the water being brackish and covered with green scum - our standard of living had tumbled overnight, even from the grim fare that had been cur lot as members of the fortress



garrison. Several of our people were bayoneted to death at that well trying to get water out of hours for the sick, their bodies being left there as an abject lesson to others who took it into their noggins to get water out of hours. Over all hung the stench of the battlefield, the greater percentage of the dead. having not yet been interred. We dug our latrines and buried some of our dead on the slopes surrounding the 92nd Garage flat - a most unsanitary piece of engineering, but it was almost the only thing we could do, every inch of flat area being taken up by prisoners. A few nights later, the torential sub-tropical spring rains commenced and washed the contents of the graves and the toilet facilities down amongst us to our great inconvenieence and utter embar assment. Finally the Japanese organized us into work and clean-up battalions and the great job of burying the dead began. We had to urinate in our own

handerchiefs and place them across our noses to counteract the extremely horrible smell. Many became sick from these labors and were cudgled brutally by the Japanese back to work. I remember burying several of my friends but in many cases it was all we could do under that scorching tropical sunto dig a mere mass grave, quite shallow, and put the dead in it. The rains would undo it all a few days later and we'd be back at it again in the muck and mud. The Japanese heaped up their dead and burned them, many small white boxes being sent back to the next of kin in dear of Nicpon. Lord knows who's ashes arrived at what addresses since the boxes were filled by shovels most indiscriminately. One thing I remember was that the Japanese burial parties carefully removed all gold teeth before the fire was kindled (Continued on page 16)

Foreign Navy Men Join SeaLab III Experiment

Five Navy men from three foreign countries will join U.S. Navy men in the SEALAB III experiment off the coast of Southern California this summer.

The Royal Australian Navy is sending one officer and the Royal Navy and Royal Canadian Navy will each be represented by an officer and an enlisted man.

Only one diver from each of the navies will take part in the undersea portion of the project. The other men will be assigned to support teams on the surface.

Before the two month project begins, the foreign aquanauts will train with U.S. aquanauts at the Navy Experimental Diving Unit, Washington, D.C.

SEALAB III will be conducted at depths of 450 to 600 feet near California's San Clemente Island. Five diving teams of eight men each will live underwater for successive 12 day periods.

The SEALAB Program involves a wide range of experiments in salvage techniques, oceanographic and marine biological research and a series of physiological and human performance tests.

The Navy now has a new SCORE Program for men in the following rates: DK, DM, IM, LI, ML, MN, PC, PH, PR, PN, and SH to convert to more open or fast moving rates.

- To be eligible, personnel must be: (1) serving in pay grade E3 (identified striker), E4, or E5.
- (2) have not less than 21 months nor more than 10 years of active military service.
- (3) must enlist/re-enlist or extend for a total obligation of 6 years.
- (4) obtain BuPers approval prior to enlisting re-enlisting or extending.

Personnel must also meet the minimum test score requirements for entrance into the appropriate Class "A" school.

I will be glad to go over the SCORE Program with any man that wants to find out if his present rate is included in this program. There are also 37 rates that are in the "neutral" category that can convert to higher V.R.B. ratings.
