What Is Marijuana?

Marijuana is Indian hemp (Cannabis sativa). The parts with the highest tetrahydrocannabinol (THC) content are the flowering tops of the plant. The leaves have 2 smaller amount. The stalks and seeds have little or none. THC is believed to be the active ingredient in marijuana. Many other compounds are present in marijuana, but they do not produce the mental effects of the drug.

Does Marijuana Vary In Strength?

Yes. Some marihuana may produce no effect whatsoever. A small amount of strong marijuana may produce marked effects. The THC content of the plant determines its mind-altering activity, and this varies from none to more than 2 percent THC. Because THC is somewhat unstable, its content in marijuana decreases as time passes.

The plant that grows wild in the United States is low in THC content compared to cultivated marijuana, or the Mexican, Lebanese, or Indian varieties. Climate, soil conditions, the time of harvesting and other factors determine the potency.

What Is Hashish?

Hashish (hash) is the dark brown resin that is collected from the tops of potent Cannabis sativa. It is at least five times stronger than marijuana. Since it is stronger, the effect on the user is naturally more intense, and the possibility of side effects is greater.

Is Marijuana An Addicting Drug?

Marijuana does not lead to physical dependence. Therefore, it cannot be considered addicting. Chronic users become psychologically dependent upon the effects or marijuana. Thus, it is classified as habituating. The fact that a drug is not addicting has little relationship to its potential for harm, since dependence, whether psychological or physical, is a serious matter.

Is Marijuana A Stimulant Or A Depressant?


Because it affects the individual's self control, the effects of marijuana vary so widely that it can be either a stimulant or a depressant. THC is a strong hallucinogen with some sedative properties. Occasionally, a person intoxicated with marijuana will become stimulated and overactive. (AFPS)

It is said that one night, when he was playing before a distinguished audience, somwhere in Italy, when suddenly a string POPed, interrupting the melody. The audience was startled. The maestro continued to play on the remaining strings, when still snother one broke the audience was filled with apprehension. Still Paginini kept on playing, now a 3rd. string broke on him, the great audience was aghast. But this did not worry the virtuoso violinist Paginini. If it did, he never showed it. "I think that the main thing is for American people to show concern for the prisoners of war and those missing in action —to let the North Vietnamese know we are concerned about our men and want them returned home in safety." Debi said.

Debi has written a poem that describes her feelings and perhaps those of other "waiting" families. Here is Debi's poem:


## MEMORIAL SERVICE HELD



## KARATE TAUGHT AT Y



#### SELF-DEFENSE LEARNED

Of all the man clubs, in the Holy Loch area, none can be as beneficial to military personnel and to their dependants, as the Karate School, located at the Dunoon YMCA. Karate is a beautiful and quite destructive art that requires years of training to attain the many different belts, that indicate the level of experience attained by the exhibitor. The first Karate club in the Holy Loch was founded by a Willie J. Baker a 3rd level Dan Black Belt in Kenpo Karate, and was assisted by todays instructors: Armando P. Carandang and Francisco J. Labalan who are both 1st. Dan Black Belt and are experienced in other forms of Karate.

Karate lessons held at the YMCA begin at 5:45 and run 'til 7:30 on Monday and Thursday's.. The classes are open to all Naval and Marine personnel and to military dependants ages 12 years (Male & Female) and older. The training begins with a formal opening, and physical excercise which is quite vigorous. Next one step sparring is conducted with emphasis on the fighting techniques, the Kata or form is practiced next this gives one the experience in putting the fighting techniques togeether. These excercises consist of hand, foot and body shifting movements essential in the kicking, punching and blocking maneuvers of Karatefighting. These techniques are based on the principle of having approximately 4-8 imaginary enemies on the attack. This provides practice in meeting attacks from any quarter of the body. A certain bodily discipline is practiced by Karate Ka's. The rules require that no physical excercise be done outside the class, that the student receive a minimum of 8 hours of sleep a day, no alcoholic beverages are to be had, and a diet of good protein foods is to be followed. Karate is revered by its disciples and it is to be feared by those who intend to harm

either a student or his family.

# MARINES PLAY WAR war games hell but fun

The scene is the Holy Loch in 1974, several years after the collapse of the Heath government in Great Britain. A Scottish Nationalist Government has seized power and set up a "Workers Republic", all Scottish and American Forces have been expelled and all HM Forces in Scotland have moved "South of the Border. A "Mutual Peace Pact" with the Soviet Union has been drawn and entered into by Scotland. Tom (SUPER SOUL) DeLaPena Lead Guitarist and manages to sing Steve (King Kong) Killoran Drummer and Songbird.




power, the men are ever present.



The Greek ship and the star cluster represent the Argo Navis constellation in which the star CANOPUS resides. The big star connecting


the scroll and the shield is CANOPUS.
