The extensive and diversified capabilities in CANOPUS and her crew were put to good use early this month in an interesting and unusual manner. I refer to a Gas Gangrene victim treated in CANOPUS' recompression chamber.

An Army Private, stationed in Liberia, developed gas gangrene of the left leg following a motorcycle accident on June 8.

The soldier was taken to a missionary doctor where his wound was sutured. Two days later, swelling of the leg accompanied by great pain forced a visit to the civilian physician in the American Embassy in Monrovia. The inflammation and gases escaping from the wound site enabled the Embassy doctor to diagnose gas gangrene, a disease rarely found among Americans.

Gas gangrene is caused by members of the Clostridia family of bacteria. These bacteria are very widely found in nature, but rarely cause disease because they can only grow and produce toxins in an infected wound in which oxygen has been excluded. It is the toxins, tissue poisons, which produce the destruction of muscle and the formation of gas that characterize this disease. Gas gangrene is treated with high doses of antibiotics and by placing the patient in a chamber where oxygen under pressure is driven into the tissues.

The patient was rushed to Rota on June 11 and aboard CANOPUS which had the nearest pressure chamber. Supervised by Dr. Urbanc, CSS 16 Medical Officer, and with the assistance of Lt. Whitaker and the CANOPUS divers, the patient was pressurized in the chamber for a total of six hours over the next four days. Several physicians from the Air Force medical facilities in Weisbaden, Germany flew to CANOPUS to observe the procedures and techniques employed.

"Consequences, good or . . . ?"

A very learned and busy man once said, "I don't allow myself to think seriously about religion. I'm afraid of the consequences". I sometimes think that statement answers the question that plagues me every week when I record the number of men attending Divine Services on the ship. I make it a habit to invite every man who comes into my office to attend church and I have never received a flat NO for an answer. Most of the answers are covered in the first half of the above quote - I don't allow myself to think seriously about religion. When I press the issue into a deeper conversation I find that the real reason for failure to participate in Divine Services is the second sentence of the quotation - I'm afraid of the consequences.

This philosophy or rationalization would be perfectly right if a man feared the honest consequences, namely death, frustration, unhappiness, loss of eternal life and communication with the creator. Because fear of these consequences will never permit anyone the luxury of not thinking about religion. But the sadness of this whole treatise is the fact that the consequences people fear are really the loss of a good time, guilt feelings about over-indulgence, the need to change,

the protection of moral standards, and obedience to the laws of right.

My honest opinion on this subject is based upon observation and conversation from which I conclude my answer. People are always afraid to think seriously or practice religion because they are afraid they will have to give up more than they will receive in return.

Yow utterly sad that people will take all kinds of chance by dabbling in that which is evil, sinful, and wrong and suffer the results or consequences of pain, anxiety and frustration; rather than pursue true happiness, peace of mind, and self satisfaction by doing what is right, moral, and obedient to the laws of soci etv.

Most all of us need to reevaluate our lives, the direction we are going, and look at the consequences we are enduring.

In my long years of professional ministry I have never seen a seriously religious man in deep trouble or unhappy. This record of problems and frustration by and large falls to the one who says, "I don't allow myself to think seriously about religion".

Just in case this article inspires you to consider positively what is being said why not take the first step toward change by attending the Divine-Services of your choice this week.



WSTC RADIO

Thirty-nine months ago a radio station began aboard CANOPUS for the purpose of airing entertainment to the crew. The station was "dubbed" WSTC, meaning, "Wonderful Submarine Tender CANOPUS.

Today, WSTC continues to bring the best in listening pleasure with live shows to the crew daily through the efforts of six full-time disc jockeys and five men on a stand-by basis. All the announcers work in the station on a volunteer basis under the direction of LCdr. F. E. Whitaker, Chaplain and ship's entertainment officer. Assisting Chaplain Whitaker is SN George Heddleston, who acts as Station Manager.

They bear the job of filling new records, making a card catalog of all the WSTC records, and typing the weekly "Top 40" record survey and program logs.

WSTC is heard weeknights from 4p.m. until 9:55p.m. and from noon until 9:55p.m. on Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays. Recently the programming was adjusted so that every popular type of music is presented to the crew at some time during the week. Regular weekday shows include rock & roll, popular, and country and western music. Jazz music, along with oldie but goodie programs, are added on weekends. Oldie shows are also aired on Tuesday and Thursday evenings hosted by "Brooklyn Benny".

The majority of records in the WSTC library are supplied by the Armed Forces Radio and Television Service (A.F.R.T.S.) in Los Angeles, California. D.J.'s working in the station have added variety to the programming by playing their own records for the crew's enjoyment. A daily "Date with Chris" show is aired aboard CANOPUS, Monday thru Friday, from 8p.m. 'til 9p.m. Featured is Miss Chris Noel who provides well known hits presently on the charts in the States.

The station begins broadcasting each weekday with the Mr. Music show, hosted by Bob Reynolds, who presents the latest rock hits. Bill Downs is next with the "Top 40" show. He spins the sounds from the CANOPUS "Top 40" record popularity chart. This chart is based on the

popularity of a record with the crew, who vote for their favorites on Saturday afternoon from noon 'til 2p.m. Also helping the programming of the "Top 40" and "Mr. Music" shows are radio stations in the States, which have been sending record surveys from their local areas. Among the stations lending support are WABC Radio in New York City, WLS Radio in Chicago, CKLW Radio in Windsor, Ontario, Canada, WOWO Radio in Fort Wayne, Indiana, and WHYN Radio in Springfield, Massachusetts.
